THE ORIGINAL MEMBER-OWNERS of Hamilton County Electric Cooperative gave us a gift that lives on every time you elect members to the board of directors, earn capital credits or light up your Christmas tree.

The rural Texans who worked together to build your electric cooperative are the reason you can turn on the lights, watch your favorite holiday movies and cook a Christmas feast.

During the holiday season, remember the determined folks who helped bring electricity to the rural communities and farms that the big electricity companies refused to serve. Our urban neighbors were enjoying the quality of life that electricity delivers decades earlier because the density of big cities made it economically viable to build distribution lines between close-together residents.

Some 80 years ago, our area, with its spread-out farms and ranches, got left behind until our co-op's founders secured the funds to build electric lines over miles and miles of Texas countryside.

Perhaps your grandparents or your neighbors' relatives collected membership fees as they got things started and shared those stories. Or maybe you heard tales of families' first Christmases with electricity. Imagine opening presents under a shining lightbulb for the first time rather than a candle or lamp, or having a refrigerator to keep Christmas dinner fixings fresh.

Those folks sacrificed so their families could enjoy lighting, heat and the convenience of appliances—just like those who lived in the cities. They laid the foundation for the at-your-fingertips electric, phone and internet service that you enjoy today.

The holiday season, with its warmth and bounty, is a great time to appreciate our co-op's founding stories and the gift of modern conveniences that electricity brings to our lives.

When you take your Christmas dinner out of the oven this season or when you switch on your electric heat to make the house cozy over the holiday, remember those who lived without the convenience of electricity—and that they wanted it so badly they took matters into their own hands.

They passed that gift on to the next generations of co-op owners so we can enjoy it this Christmas and all year long.



# Switch to LED Holiday Lights This Year

IF YOU'RE PLANNING to deck the halls with your years-old incandescent holiday lights, as you do every Christmas season, it's time to break tradition and switch to LEDs. They're more efficient and durable and last longer than your old strands. They're cool to the touch and won't burn out for a very long time if used correctly.

Their ability to stay cool makes them safer to hang on a Christmas tree, from your roof or on your balustrade.

They won't send your holiday electric bills through the roof, and they offer about the same quality of light as your originals.

LEDs are a holiday gift to yourself that keeps on giving year-round: The bulbs use 75% less energy and last about 25 times longer than incandescent lights.

They are a bit more expensive to purchase than traditional light strands, but the energy savings will offset that before Santa makes it down the chimney.

# Hamilton County EC Scholarships Available



**WILL YOUR 2022** high school graduate need college money? Hamilton County Electric Cooperative will award scholarships for the 2022–2023 school year (\$500 per fall and spring semester).

To be eligible, your student must:

- ▶ Be a senior attending a high school within the HCEC service area and graduating in May 2022.
- ▶ Be a dependent of an active HCEC member.
- ▶ Reside full time in the home of a parent or guardian who is a full-time resident in Hamilton County EC's service area.
- ▶ Have applied for admission as a full-time student to a technical school, college or university.

Scholarship winners must use the scholarship within one year of issuance. Applications are now available and will be accepted until March 31, 2022. Scholarship winners will be chosen by a committee independent of Hamilton County EC. Youth Tour represents one of our most important investments in the future of the communities we serve. Participating students travel to Austin and Washington to learn about the critical role of electric cooperatives, meet their congressional representatives, and gain a deeper perspective on the history and mechanisms of our democracy.

Attendees often return with a renewed commitment to their hometowns, and many have gone on to become teachers, doctors, lawyers, politicians and even co-op employees in those communities.

We are honored to join our fellow Texas electric cooperatives in carrying on the enduring legacy of Youth Tour.

# Win a Trip to Washington, DC!

Youth Tour is June 12-21, 2022

**HAMILTON COUNTY** Electric Cooperative will sponsor two students on the Government-in-Action Youth Tour, an all-expenses-paid, 10-day guided trip to Austin and Washington, D.C., June 12–21, 2022. Hamilton County

EC is proud to carry on its commitment to empowering local teens from its service area to participate in the trip, which is organized by Texas Electric Cooperatives.

Students selected for this opportunity join more than 150 of their peers from Texas and some 1,900 other students from across the U.S. on this fun-filled trip. Designed to give high school students insight into U.S. history, cooperatives and the workings of federal government, Youth Tour expands participants' horizons.



Electric cooperatives in Texas have participated in the program since 1965, when they joined forces to follow then-Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson's call to send students to the nation's capital to "actually see what the flag stands for and represents."

The trip starts with a day in Austin, where students tour the state Capitol, Bullock Texas State History Museum and Texas State Cemetery. They then fly to Washington for an action-packed week that includes tours of historic sites and museums and visits to congressional offices, where they meet with their U.S. representatives.

Other highlights of the trip include a wreath-laying ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and an evening cruise on the Potomac River. Participants also attend Youth Day, hosted by the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association, for a day of learning and inspirational speakers.

A sense of purpose has guided co-ops throughout their existence, and for HCEC and other electric cooperatives across the country, that means investing in our young people—the leaders of tomorrow.

You could be a part of this legacy shared by the more than 3,800 past Texas Youth Tour students.

**Eligibility:** Students who have completed their sophomore year of high school and whose parent or legal guardian is a member of Hamilton County EC are eligible to apply for this trip of a lifetime.

Contest rules: Students must complete a 2022 Youth Tour application and submit an essay not to exceed 500 words on the following theme: Describe a service project that would benefit your community. The winners will be chosen according to originality and content of their essays. Essays must be attached to the completed application and submitted no later than February 11, 2022.

Veterans Memorial, October 1-May 30, 2022. Hamilton American Legion Cunningham Post 222 is planning a new permanent memorial to Hamilton County veterans. The plan, designed by Riley-Gardner Monument Company, includes three large black granite tablets engraved with the names of the 151 Hamilton County veterans who died in battle during the various conflicts of our country. The centerpiece of the memorial will feature a large hand-carved black granite eagle resting on a black granite hexagonal base. This base will be laserengraved with the POW/MIA emblem on the front and the emblems of the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines and Coast Guard on the other five sides.  1 cup cranberry juice
 2% cups unsweetened pineapple juice


1 liter ginger ale ½ cup sugar

# Fly Drones Safely

**IF YOU FIND** a drone under the Christmas tree this season, be sure to take time to learn how to use it safely.

Keep drones away from overhead power lines. If a drone flies into a power line, it could cause power outages and result in downed lines, which pose a dangerous electrical safety hazard.

Keep these other safety guidelines in mind:

- Before flying the drone, check it for damage. Have a damaged drone repaired before use.
- Never fly drones higher than 400 feet.
- Do not fly the drone beyond your line of sight.
- ▶ Do not fly near airports, manned aircraft, stadiums or people.
- Do not fly for commercial purposes, unless specifically authorized by the Federal Aviation Adminstration.
- ▶ Do not fly in bad weather conditions, such as in low visibility or high winds.
- Never fly your drone recklessly. You could be fined for endangering people or other aircraft.
