# **Ready Your Home for a Winter Break**

IF YOU'RE PLANNING TO BE OUT OF TOWN FOR AN EXTENDED TIME DURING THE HOLIdays, take heed of the following recommendations to save some energy and keep your home safe.

Set the thermostat to 50 degrees. This is a happy midpoint that avoids wasting energy to warm an empty house while still preventing damage to pipes and plants. If sub-20-degree days are forecast for while you are away, drip faucets.

Turn off your electric water heater at the breaker or set it to the lowest temperature possible.

To avoid a fire hazard, unplug the washer and dryer when you leave. Disconnect the hoses leading to the washer to prevent them from freezing.

Unplug all small appliances. You'll reduce the risk of a house fire and save a bit on your electric bill.

Don't broadcast your travel plans on social media. Instead, share photos from your trip after you return.

If you set a timer for lights and sprinklers, make sure to switch up the times over the days you'll be gone so it's not obvious to any onlookers that the house is empty when lights go on at 6 p.m. every day like clockwork. If possible, stagger several timers that control different lights to approximate the natural movement of someone through a house.

Close blinds and curtains. Don't advertise your belongings to any would-be house burglars.

Be strategic about putting out post-holiday recycling and trash. If you have a lot of boxes from new gadgets or other expensive electronics, wait until you get back to put them out so they're not sitting outside in full view for days. Or have a trusted neighbor set them by the curb on the appropriate day.

Place a hold on mail and newspaper deliveries, and ask a neighbor or friend to pick up any packages from your porch.

# **New Meter Policy Takes** Effect in 2020

**EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 2020, ONLY** qualified Hamilton County Electric Cooperative employees may remove or reinstall meters. Neither electricians who are unaffiliated with Hamilton County EC nor the co-op's members will be allowed to remove or reinstall meters.

Members and electricians must contact the cooperative to request a meter removal and reinstallation by cooperative personnel. Upon receiving the request, we will do everything within our power to complete the work promptly. We recommend that you notify us in advance, preferably with at least 24 hours' notice.

To request meter removal or reinstallation, call the cooperative's main office at (254) 386-3123 or 1-800-595-3401 Monday-Friday, 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Servicemen will not remove or reinstall meters after office hours or on weekends except in emergency situations.

HCEC employees are required to follow federal laws when working around energized equipment. The following regulations apply when HCEC personnel work with energized meters:

- 1. OSHA 1910.269(I)(1)(i): Only qualified employees may work on or with exposed energized lines or parts of equipment.
- 2. OSHA 1926.960: Outlines general requirements for necessary personal protective equipment when working around energized equipment.

For Hamilton County EC employees, required PPE consists of a nonconductive hard hat, safety glasses, flame-resistant clothing, rubber gloves with leather protectors, fully closed-toe leather footwear and an arc flash face shield.

We regret that we must make the procedural change restricting meter removal and reinstallation to cooperative staff, but it is necessary for the safety of our members and to limit HCEC's liability.



# **Decorate Your Home Safely During the Holiday Season**

#### IT'S TIME TO DECK THOSE HALLS—SAFELY. MORE THAN 800 HOME FIRES ARE CAUSED

by holiday decorations each year, according to the National Fire Protection Association. An additional 170 home fires are caused by Christmas trees each year.

Keep these tips in mind for a safe holiday season.

Carefully inspect all electrical decorations before you use them. Cracked or damaged sockets and loose or exposed wires can cause serious shock or start a fire.

Make sure all extension cords and electrical decorations are being used properly indoor-rated cords indoors, outdoor-rated cords for outside decorations.

**Inspect extension cords for damage** and discard (not repair) any that are not completely intact.

**Never mount or support light strings** in a way that might damage the cord's insulation. Outdoor electrical lights and decorations should be plugged into circuits protected by ground-fault circuit interrupters.

**Exercise caution when decorating near power lines.** Keep yourself and your ladder at least 10 feet from power lines.

Turn off all indoor and outdoor electrical decorations before leaving home or going to sleep.

Avoid overloading electrical outlets with too many decorations or electrical devices. They can overheat and cause a fire.

**Never connect more than three strings** of incandescent lights together. Water your Christmas tree daily.

Keep all decorations at least 3 feet away from heating elements.

**Avoid using candles.** The flames are just too dangerous with all the flammable decorations around.

Purchase electrical decorations from reputable retailers and that are approved  $by\ a$ nationally recognized testing lab such as UL, Intertek or CSA.

# **Inspect Labels** for Safety

#### AS THE HOLIDAY SEASON GETS INTO

full swing, sales of electrical products tend to spike.

Unfortunately, the busy shopping season also brings out counterfeiters who use shoddy materials and don't comply with regulatory standards, enabling them to steeply discount their prices-such that no legitimate manufacturer can match them. Counterfeit materials pose significant safety hazards that can lead to damaged property, injury or death.

To stay safe and avoid wasting money on knockoffs, take the following steps:

Look for safety certification logos from nationally recognized testing laboratories. UL. CSA. Intertek's ETL. NSF and Nemko are a few of the trustworthy marks.

**Retain some skepticism.** If a bargain seems too good to be true, skip it.

Shop with reputable vendors who get their merchandise from legitimate distributors and manufacturers.

Check an item's label for grammatical or spelling errors. Those red flags can signal fraudulent branding.

Look for the name and contact information of the manufacturer on the item or its packaging. If that information is missing, think twice.

Stay vigilant: Read labels on every purchase. Counterfeit products range from phone chargers and smoke detectors to TVs, laptops and game systems.





# **Cool Off Your Winter Energy Bill**

YOU'VE BUDGETED FOR HOLIDAY GIFTS, MEALS, MAYBE A VACATION—BUT WITH MONEY tight, that doesn't leave much room for energy efficiency upgrades at home. Does that mean you're powerless to lower your electric bill? Not at all. Keep your energy bill cool this winter with these tips and tricks.

**Drape delivery.** Are you using your curtains to retain heat? Open drapes and shades to catch free solar heat during the day. Close them at night to keep the heat inside.

**Got tape?** Though not as durable as foam or vinyl, you can use nonporous tape (first-aid cloth tape, for example) to keep cold air from infiltrating your home. Tape is good for blocking corners and irregular cracks, and can be used at the top and bottom of a window sash, door frames, attic hatches and inoperable windows.

**Pull the plug.** Unplug any appliance or electronic device that you don't regularly use. Most devices use electricity anytime they are plugged in even if they are off.

Be a fan of fans. Run ceiling fans on low and reverse the rotation to blow air up in winter. This keeps warm air circulating without cooling you.

Flue flux. Be sure your fireplace damper is tightly closed anytime the fireplace is not being used.

Free your vents. Your heating, ventilating and air conditioning system will have to work twice as hard if your air vents are blocked by rugs, furniture or drapes. Keep them clear to allow air to flow freely.

Get caulking. Add caulk or weatherstripping to seal gaps around leaky doors and

Garage drain. Leave your garage door down. A warmer garage in winter will save energy.

**Rug relief.** Have a spare rug? Use it to cover bare floors for added insulation.

Bundle up. Slip on some fuzzy socks and a sweater and lower the thermostat. You can save 5% for every degree you drop your thermostat between 60 and 70 degrees.

Smart food. When cooking, keep lids on pots and let hot food cool off before placing it in the refrigerator.

There are other ways to conserve energy, too. Remember, you don't pay for what you don't use. When you're not watching TV or using lights, computers or other electronics, turn them off.




